

TOMORROW NO IS THERE

Think about it.

Today is tomorrow, a day early or today was tomorrow, yesterday.

In some ways tomorrow is only a theoretical concept, an idea.

Have you ever gone anywhere or done anything tomorrow?

You might be thinking, “What about all of those people who buy insurance. They are counting on a tomorrow or they wouldn’t be spending their money to protect themselves from something that might happen tomorrow.”

Obviously, only a fool does not plan ahead. We do have to prepare for the future; but, just because we prepare for a future does not guarantee that we will have one.

Tomorrow is not real until it becomes today.

When we refer to tomorrow, what we actually mean is, “My next today.”

You may make plans for tomorrow; but, if they are carried out, it will actually be done during what we call today.

Today is the closest you will ever come to tomorrow, even though we walk and talk as if tomorrow is as real as today.

Of course we also have yesterday.

Unfortunately yesterday is history. It’s simply a memory. You can’t do anything yesterday. You can celebrate or regret what you did yesterday, but you cannot undo, change or in any way alter anything you did yesterday.

All you have to do is tell God that you accept what Jesus did for you and give your life to Him. Remember the old adage that you were taught as a child? “Don’t put off until tomorrow what you can do today.” Will you trust Jesus today?

In reality today is the only thing we can count on.

Even today can be tricky.

We tend to think that we have an infinite number of todays available to us. We assume that when today ends it will automatically be replaced by another. We assume that when today is finished we have a right to another, as if somebody owes it to us.

Of course, when we think about it, we realize there is a flaw in such reasoning. We know from experience that each of us has a finite number of days—some more, some less. None of us lives forever.

It’s no coincidence that in the Bible God addresses the subject of tomorrow.

What is that decision?

Anyone who wants to go to

Heaven must decide to accept Jesus

Christ as their Savior.

You might be asking yourself,

“Why do I need a Savior? What do I

need to be saved from?”

There is one thing that will keep

us from going to Heaven—SIN.

Unfortunately, all of us have

sinned. (Romans 3:23)

That’s where Jesus comes in.

Why Jesus? Because Jesus died

on a cross to pay the penalty for

your sin (I Peter:2:24).

God is willing to accept the

sacrifice that Jesus made for you. In

effect, He is willing to let Jesus be

your substitute.

The Bible says, “**Go now ye that say, Today or to morrow we will go into such a city and continue there a year, and buy and sell, and get gain. Whereas ye know not what shall be on the morrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, then vanish away. For that ye ought to say, If the Lord will, we shall live, and do this or that.**” (James 4:13-15)

Another passage gives us an even more serious reminder. “... **now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation.**” (II Corinthians 6:2)

You might be wondering, “So, what does that have to do with me?”

It places a premium on what

you do with today.

After our days run out, all of

us are headed into eternity.

The Bible tells us that all of

us will spend eternity in one of

two places: in Heaven with God

or in Hell separated from God and

experiencing His punishment.

The Bible also tells us that

which of the two destinations we

go to depends upon a decision we

make while we are still living,

while it is still today.

Since we have no guarantee

that we will have a tomorrow—our

decision must be made today—no

tomorrow decisions, no procrastina-

tion.
